SUMMARY

The Department of Juvenile Services (DJS) provides individualized care and treatment to youth under the age of eighteen who violate criminal law, who are likely to violate that law, or who are likely to endanger themselves or others. This responsibility is carried out through residential and non-residential care programs. The State's capital improvement program addresses the facilities in which the residential programs are performed. These include community residential facilities, secure detention facilities, and secure commitment facilities.

Community residential facilities offer programs designed to prevent youth from being placed in a secure residential facility, or to facilitate the return of previously institutionalized youth to the community. Examples of community residential facilities are group homes and youth centers.

Secure detention facilities hold youth who have been authorized for emergency detention by a DJS Intake Officer, or who have been accused of an offense which would be a felony if committed by an adult and who have been ordered detained by the Juvenile Court. Such youth may be awaiting a delinquency hearing or trial to determine whether a delinquent act has been committed or may be awaiting appropriate disposition.

Secure commitment facilities hold youth who are entrusted to the Department for long-term treatment in a secure setting. Under current guidelines, only serious and/or chronic offenders are recommended for secure commitment.
