# SUMMARY

Miscellaneous grants are included in the State's capital budget each year. These grants do not fit into the departmental categories and are presented in this "Miscellaneous" category.

This category includes executive initiatives of Statewide importance, such as grants to private higher educational facilities and grants to the subdivisions for local jails. These projects meet one or more of the following criteria:

- They have an important public purpose and serve a large number of Maryland citizens,
- The project will be capital in nature and have a useful life expectancy of at least 15 years,
- The project is well enough developed to justify funding and will be ready for financing within two years,
- State support is needed for the success of the project.

The Adventure Sports Center International is a component of the public-private venture between DC Development, LLC, Adventure Sports Center, Inc., and Garrett College. The facility will be co-located with the Garrett College Athletic and Community Recreation Center and will house the headquarters for Adventure Sports Center Inc., an Adventure Sports Museum and the Whitewater Hall of Fame.

#### East Baltimore Biotechnology Park

Redevelop the 80-acre area north of the Johns Hopkins Medical Center to include 1.3 to 2 million square feet of biotechnology research space, employing up to 8,000 people. Redevelopment of this area will encourage construction/rehabilitation of up to 2,000 housing units, attract a mixed-income community, create job opportunities, improve public safety and community services, and provide more open space. Public investment will be concentrated on the acquisition and demolition of property (56% vacant), and infrastructure/public improvements. The estimated cost of the redevelopment plan totals \$973 million.

#### WestSide Revitalization Project

Provide funds for the WestSide Revitalization Project, including acquisition, demolition, and preparation of land for economic and community development. The FY 2006 funds will complete property acquisition of the 3.6-acre Fayette-Howard-Lexington-Liberty Streets "Superblock", the demolition of selected properties, and preparation of the land for redevelopment. Baltimore City has a \$350 million redevelopment plan for the downtown's West Side. The public contribution towards this project totals over \$50 million, of which the State's contribution is \$37.4 million.

#### Catholic Charities - Our Daily Bread (Baltimore City)

Construct a 50,000 GSF facility near downtown Baltimore City to house Our Daily Bread and other programs to help disadvantaged persons; and convert the 17,000 GSF Weinberg Building, which now houses those programs, to accommodate My Sister's Place, currently located in a townhouse. All of these programs have outgrown their existing locations. The new building will include dining and support space for Our Daily Bread, which serves 800 people a day; program and office space for Christopher Place Academy, which will rehabilitate and find employment and housing for up to 100 homeless addicted men each year; and program and office space for St. Jude's Employment Center, which finds employment for over 100 individuals each year. The Weinberg Building will be converted to house My Sister's Place, a program that helps about 60 homeless women and their children each day stabilize their lives and prepare for a better future.

# Garrett College Athletic and Community Recreation Center (Garrett County)

Construct the new 142,000 GSF Garrett College Athletic and Community Recreation Center at an off-campus site located on Marsh Mountain in McHenry. Garrett College is one of four partners in the public-private economic development project on top of Marsh Mountain. Other partners are: the private developer DC Development, LLC; a 501(c)(3) charitable organization known as Adventure Sports Center, Inc.; and Garrett County Memorial Hospital. The facility will house the College's physical education department, including gymnasiums, aquatic facilities, racquetball courts, and a wellness/fitness center. The facility will also have three meeting/classrooms, a multi-purpose room, lounge, senior room, game room, and a catering kitchen. Garrett County Memorial Hospital will install a 2,500 SF clinic inside the Center. The clinic will provide urgent clinical care and support associate degree programs offered by Garrett College. FY 2006 funds are for design.

# Girl Scout Council of the Nation's Capital (Charles, Montgomery, and Prince George's Counties)

Provide funds to assist in the design and construction of various improvements at Camp Aquasco in Prince George's County, Camp Brighton Woods in Montgomery County, and Camp Winona in Charles County. A Property Task Force, authorized by the Board of Directors, analyzed the use of the properties and identified a plan for the future. The property plan does not involve the acquisition of any additional land. Major components of the plan for the three camps include: increasing facilities for troop camping, upgrading of the water system at one camp, improving nature study facilities, and preparing one property for future use as a resident camp by constructing a dining hall, swimming pool, shower house and additional troop camping units. Once completed, new construction and renovations will increase capacity at the camps by 30%.

#### Girl Scouts of Central Maryland (Cecil County)

Provide funds to assist in the renovation, stabilization, and restoration of the historic 1868 Bell Manor located at Camp Conowingo in Cecil County. In the late 1990's an architectural evaluation was performed on the building and restoration needs were identified. The Girl Scouts used Bell Manor as a Program Center until 2000 when the need for extensive renovations forced them to stop using the property for program events and sleepovers. FY 2006 State funds will be used to complete ADA compliant renovations, interior and exterior renovations, and health and safety additions including a fire/smoke detection system, emergency lighting and additional means of egress. Once renovation is completed, Bell Manor will provide historic programming to an estimated 4,500 Maryland girls each year.

The 864,850 GSF of space will contain 320 beds, 20 operating rooms, and procedure suites to support various hospital programs. These programs include the Adult Emergency Department, Acute Care Program, Critical Care Program, Interventional and Surgical Services Program, Non-Invasive Diagnostic and Treatment Program, and Non-Invasive Imaging Program. The existing Cardiovascular and Critical Care functions are located in obsolete, aging buildings, many of which are over 30 years old. The State's contribution to this project totals \$25,000,000.

#### Pediatric Trauma Center

Construct space for a Pediatric Trauma Center at the new Children's and Maternal Hospital on the Johns Hopkins East Baltimore campus. The 143,542 GSF of space will be integrated throughout the 538,000 GSF medical building and will include a trauma center, in-patient rooms, a neo-natal Intensive Care Center, and acute care programs for children in oncology, psychiatry, and cardiac and pulmonary diagnostics. The existing Hopkins Pediatric Trauma Center is the only such center in the State of Maryland and treats over 6,000 children for illness and injuries every year. The existing Center is over 30 years old and is unable to meet the demands of new medical and diagnostic techniques. The State's share of this project totals \$25 million.

Lyric Opera House - Stage House Expansion (Baltimore Ci	ty) FY 2006 Total	\$1,000

Renovate the Lyric Opera House to expand the stage area and to modernize the back stage rigging system and support areas. The Lyric Opera House, originally constructed in 1895, is home for the Baltimore Opera and one of the city's best venues for traveling Broadway shows and other theatrical productions. The height and depth of the stage will be increased to allow the Baltimore Opera Company to bring productions that currently cannot fit onto the Lyric stage because it is too shallow and too low. The existing rigging system used to handle scenery is functionally inadequate because it cannot handle heavy loads or equipment. In addition, the loading dock will be redesigned to accommodate two tractor-trailers simultaneously. The proposed improvements will allow the Lyric to increase attendance by up to 20% by providing a greater variety of productions.
